A RITE OF Remembrance and Repentance

Monday and Tuesday of this coming week, May 31 and June 1, mark the 100th anniversary of the Tulsa Massacre, one of the worst incidents of racial violence in our American history. More than 10,000 sisters and brothers of color were left homeless by this attack on what was described as a thriving 'black wall street.' More than 800 people died, an entire community was terrorized, and it resulted in devastating generational economic loss. This horrendous tragedy was largely omitted from local, state and national histories.

Refusing to acknowledge sin against God and our neighbors thwarts our ability to move forward with mercy, justice and love. We believe that the public act of repentance, sometimes called corporate confession, can be a key step toward reconciliation with God, and between ourselves and others.

We have therefore chosen to begin our worships this weekend by remembering this historic act of violent racism and confessing the systemic roots of racism that continue to harm us all today. We do so trusting in the hope that is all of ours in Christ.



Our Faith, Justice and Racial Reconciliation ministry, formally begun in 2021, has a display of reading materials in our narthex, as well as a brochure describing this ministry and resources they have found helpful. Members of this ministry invite you to join them and are available for conversation.

Cotton strands in colors of humanity are available for you today. Thank you to our youth ministry in preparing the strands. We invite you to tie one or two strands around your wrist today as an act of prayerful awareness as you remember and lament the events of this 100th anniversary this week. You will likely need assistance to tie a strand around your wrist, which can in itself be a form of symbolic prayer.

All: We lament and repent of our complicity in racial injustice.

- Leader: We have failed by both our actions and inactions, consciously and unconsciously, to love you with our whole heart and to love our neighbors as ourselves. We have chosen our own comfort and privilege over the wellbeing of our neighbors, and have turned away from your call to do justice, love mercy and walk humbly with you.
- All: We lament and repent of our complicity in racial injustice.

- Leader: Open our eyes, O God, to all that goes on around us and within us that contributes to racial injustice. Help us discern, both personally and as a society, all that prevents us from defending the dignity of our sisters and brothers, and especially at this time, our siblings of color who are now feeling so much pain.
- All: Hear us, O God, and forgive us. Grant us grace to reflect on our own actions. Strengthen us to move forward in justice, love and mercy.





SECOND LESSON

¹²Brothers and sisters, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh—¹³for if you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live. ¹⁴For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. ¹⁵For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! Father!" ¹⁶it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, ¹⁷and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ—if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

NICENE CREED







THE CHURCH YEAR

Holy Trinity

In the church, the **liturgical year** focuses on the life and ministry of Jesus. The changing seasons of the church year provide an opportunity to celebrate the Christian faith in worship. The seasons are Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, and Pentecost.

The **sixth season** of the church year is **Pentecost.** Today is Holy Trinity Sunday, the First Sunday After Pentecost. On this day, the church celebrates the mystery that God is triune (three-in-one), Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. By the power of the Holy Spirit, Christians accept this mystery as a fundamental article of faith.

The changing liturgical colors in the sanctuary serve to adorn the worship space and to call attention to the nature of the season or festival being celebrated. The liturgical color for Holy Trinity Sunday is white, symbolizing the holiness and perfection of God.
